WHY PRESIDENT MCKINLEY BECAME A MASON

When General Horatio King asked William McKinley how he happen to become a Mason he explained: "After the Battle of Opequam, I went with the surgeon of our Ohio regiment to the field where there were about 5,000 Confederate prisoners under guard. Almost as soon as we passed the guard, I noticed the doctor shook the hands with a number of Confederate prisoners. He also took from his pocket a roll of bills and distributed all he had among them. Boy-like, I looked on in wonderment; I didn't know what it all meant. On the way back from camp I asked him:

"Did you know these men or ever see them before?" "No," replied the doctor, "I never saw them before." "But," I persisted, "You gave them a lot of money, all you had about you. Do you ever expect to get it back?" "Well" said the doctor, "If they are able to pay me back, they will. But it makes no difference to me; they are brother Masons in trouble and I am only doing my duty."

"I said to myself, If that is Freemasonry I will take some of it for myself."

On August 23, 1879, Lodge No. 239 of France held a meeting in a balloon flying over Paris, at which time a Brother was initiated.

VALLEY OF TAMPA HISTORICAL EVENTS ILL. C. DONALD PROSSER, 33°

At the January 18, 1938 meeting the Valley of Tampa instituted "slow classes." This consisted of a weekly conferring and communicating of the various 29 degrees, culminating in the candidates being consecrated "Masters of the Royal Secret." The year concluded with the addition of 27 new Scottish Rite Brothers. The country still being in the grips of the "Great Depression" the Valley of Tampa showed considerable financial difficulty, with \$10,000.00 owed on the mortgage for the Temple located at Marion and Lafayette Sts. Our unpaid per capita to the Supreme Council for the years 1932, 1933, and 1934, in the amount of \$3,305.10, as well as other debts for a total of \$638.01.

On July 13, 1939, the Federal Government designated a new airfield at "Catfish Point" for a U. S. Army Air Corp Bomber Base. Germany began WW II by attacking Poland on September 1, 1939. England and France immediately declared WAR on Germany. Locally due to the lack of funds, all schools in Hillsborough County were reduced to a 6 months term.

Did you know?

In the Grand Jurisdiction of Kentucky, when a Lodge receives a waiver of jurisdiction in favor of a candidate from a Lodge having jurisdiction, where the initiation fee of the Lodge granting jurisdiction is higher than the initiation fee of the Lodge that is requesting the waiver, the candidate pays the higher fee and the difference in the fees must be paid to the Lodge granting the waiver.

When Bernt Balchen, explorer and air pioneer, flew over the North Pole and the South Pole with Brother

Richard E. Byrd, they dropped Masonic flags on both Poles. In the 1933-35 expedition over the South Pole, Brother Balchen also tossed his Shrine fez on the Pole.

Patriotic Crowd Unfurls Salute To Flag Day

TOWN 'N COUNTRY - Jackie Miller and several hundred neighbors didn't let rain dampen their patriotic spirit during the annual Tampa Scottish Rite Patriotic Flag Day.

"I believe in America," she said, taking shelter from the storm. "I believe in supporting our troops and I love my country. I am out here to show support for all of it."

Miller, wearing red, white and blue star earrings, a red, white and blue plaid top, blue pants and red shoes, adorned her country's colors with a yellow ribbon pin to show her support for the troops.

"I think that if you love your country, this is an event you can enjoy," said Miller, a member of the Troops Support Alliance. "I understand rain kept some people away, but the heartland of America is here today."

Although Flag Day is actually today, Flag Day organizer Tom Vann thought the crowd would be larger if it were celebrated on Monday. Considering most schools are out, Vann said families were more apt to be going on vacation on the weekend.

So, despite the rain, about 100 people braved the weather and waved their flags in front of the Tampa Scottish Rite Masonic Center, 5500 Memorial Highway.

"Rain or shine, you're patriots ...," said Silvia Olson, of Lake Magdalene.

"Today we get to remember our country, our flag and what it stands for," said her friend Edna Richards, of Town 'N Country.

Still, once the weather worsened with lightning, the crowd ventured inside in time for the free barbecue dinner featuring chicken, ribs, cole slaw and tea.

Performer Debby Bacon entertained the crowd before the big show began. This year's event honored Vietnam War veterans. The names of 439 local veterans who lost their lives during the war were read.

"When the Vietnam War was over, a lot of them didn't receive the recognition," Vann said.

The program also featured patriotic tunes by Edythe Roberts and the Heralds of Harmony, as well as a presentation of gold medals to five children who lost a parent in Afghanistan or Iraq. The medals were presented to them by Brig. Gen. Steven A. Hummer of the Marine Corps, U.S. Special Operations Command.

The five children were Keira Jackson, Hunter Vance, Jocelyn and Isabella Rogers and Bryan Christian Luckey Jr.

Bryan's grandfather, Patrick Luckey, was there to see him receive the gold medal and honor his son, Army Sgt. Bryan C. Luckey, who died June 29, 2006, when he was shot by an enemy sniper while riding on the back of a Stryker vehicle in Mosul, Iraq.
