Brethren: Here we are, quickly approaching the end of another year. As in previous years, we had some pluses and some minuses. We continue to have brothers earning Double Eagle points and either being knighted and receiving their medallions or earning points to receive bars or new ribbons. It takes work to

advance in the program and brothers are stepping up to the challenge. I hope everyone will wear their Double Eagle award with pride. We have continued to impart Masonic knowledge to our members through our monthly Masonic education presentations by very learned brothers. These have been well received and we look forward to that continuing in 2021. From a financial standpoint, through September, we continue to face challenges. Your Scottish Rite is watching every penny that we spend. In 2017 we formed the Scottish Rite Valley of Tampa Charitable Foundation, Inc. to allow our members to make tax deductible donations (please consult your tax advisor) so as to provide some of the funds needed to maintain our two buildings. If you would like more information on the Foundation, please contact the General Secretary. The Foundation was also established to help with the good work of our Almoner's Fund. All donations will be greatly appreciated. Even with this Foundation, we still need to do what we can to increase revenue and decrease expenses where we can. All of the accomplishments were the result of many brethren stepping up and agreeing to do what was necessary for us to be successful.

On the downside, we continue to see losses in membership in the Valley. At the time that I am writing this article we have had 86 brothers enter the Celestial Lodge above. Add to that, we have had 9 brothers dimit and at this point, we have 92 brothers who have not yet paid their 2020 dues. On the plus side of the equation, we have 46 candidates for our Fall Reunion, 3 brothers affiliated with the Valley of Tampa and 19 were reinstated. As you can see, 46 additions to our membership is not enough to counter the losses that we anticipate at year end.

As I have done in the November/December issue of The Bulletin in previous years, I would like to take a look at our membership and where our members are coming from. At this time last year, I reported that Masonic membership in the six Masonic Districts in the jurisdiction of the Valley of Tampa, stood at 8,654 members in the Particular ... continued on page 4

Lodges in those Districts. Of that number, 1,905 were Tampa Scottish Rite members, or 22%. As of October 2020, Masonic membership is at 8,171 members with 1,735 being members of the Valley of Tampa or 21%. If we had a goal of a penetration rate of 25% that would mean another 308 Scottish Rite members. Think of the positive things that would happen with an additional 308 members in the Valley of Tampa. To obtain that number, we all need to be talking with our Blue Lodge, Shrine, Grotto and York Rite brothers who are not members of the Valley of Tampa. There are currently 59 Blue Lodges that we draw the majority of our membership from. That equates to 5 new members from each Lodge in 2021 to meet the goal of 25%. When you break it down that way, it doesn't seem to be that big of a hurdle. Brethren, we can't wait until 2021 to start working on this. We need to start now. Our Spring Reunion will be held on April 10 and 17 of 2021. Let's talk to our brothers starting now about putting those dates on their calendars. Working together we can accomplish this and probably exceed our goal. If any brother would like to know the "numbers" for your Particular Lodge or District, please let me know and I will be happy to provide them to you.

Many brothers work hard year after year for the benefit of the Valley of Tampa. I am talking of course about our Valley officers, Reunion committees and our various committees. When you attend our Reunions, you see these names listed in our Reunion Book. Four brothers, however, have been elected by their peers to manage the business of the four organizations within the Valley. A special thank you to Brother Kenny Carolan, 32° KCCH, Commander of the KCCH Organization; Brother Bryan Seland, 32°, Commander of the Scottish Rite Guard; Brother Richard Tokarz, 32°, Venerable Master of the Knights of St. Andrew; and Ill.: Gary Cavanaugh, 33°, President of the Past Masters Organization. Each of these organizations has contributed greatly to the Valley of Tampa this year. If you are not a member of one of these organizations, I encourage you to get involved with them in 2021.

There is another group of members though, that never seem to get listed anywhere, but nonetheless, are tireless workers on our behalf. I am talking about our Club Presidents; Brother Wayne Forman, 32°, North Pinellas Club; Brother David Vincent, 32°, Pinellas Club; Brother James McKiney, 32°, Sarasota Club; Brother Tom Robinson, 32°, Sun City Club; Brother Charles Walter, 32° KCCH, Nature Coast Club and Brother Steve Silvers, 32° KCCH. Tampa Club. These brothers work hard in their local area and doing wonderful things to promote the Scottish Rite. We are very fortunate to have six Scottish Rite Clubs in our area. Please check the listing of each Club and where they meet in this issue of The Bulletin. I hope that their meeting dates and times will allow you to attend one of our Club meetings. They are great times and afford a wonderful opportunity to meet new brothers and share in fellowship that the Scottish Rite offers.

Brethren, this is the time of the year that we not only give thanks for everything that we have, but we also celebrate various religious holidays. 
lege to bear witness to Masonry in action.

Member Education & Director of Work

Ancient Greek philosophers understood freedom in an external sense, as in the difference between a free man and a slave. Very little of their writings addressed freedom as an

internal condition, as in freedom of choice, thought or conscience. Their writings focused in large part on the nature of society or the necessity and application of public virtue in its functioning.

In Book III of the *Nicomachean Ethics*, Aristotle does speak of freedom as "the voluntary." Blame or praise can be attached, he asserts, only to those actions that are free and voluntary. We can be held to account for actions (or inactions) that do not occur under compulsion and only those that transpire with relevant knowledge about circumstances.

Philosophers during the Stoic period (*circa* 100 BCE-200 CE) began to develop a notion of freedom in an internal sense, including Cicero, Seneca, Epectitus (a slave), Plutarch and a religious leader, Paul. This internal sense of freedom was further expanded by Augustine of Hippo (354-430 CE) and later by Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274).

The concept of internal freedom, as it might be considered today, became more prominent during the Enlightenment Era (broadly, 1685-1815; different countries had "their own" era).

To some of this period's philosophers and writers, "freedom" became the self-mastery of individual thought, action and emotion. They built upon and developed the ideas of Aristotle, the Stoics, Aquinas and others to argue that freedom is *a choice* and independent of external circumstances.

Enter Freemasonry. The phrase "...to learn to subdue my passion..." introduces the concept of internal freedom and choice. For example, circumstances don't demand anger; anger is a choice. Internally, we are *free* to be angry or to not be angry.

Our ancient brethren encourage self-mastery of emotions and the exercise of reason throughout our ritual work. Freemasonry inculcates freedom in an internal sense. Several years before his passing, the late Jim Tresner, 33° GC, wrote a simple statement to gauge our internal freedom. Do we say: "that is just what I believe, that is just the way I am, that is just how I was raised?"

Illustrious Tresner suggested that these statements are not choices; they are an abandonment of self-mastery, personal development, the use of reason and inquiry, indeed, the search for "further light." These statements signal, in his view, that we have become slaves of either our passions or of our circumstances, or both.

Freemasonry professes the freedom for all people in an external sense. Hidden in plain sight are its assertions and teachings that we should be free in an internal sense, in our hearts and minds.

Achieving and maintaining internal freedom, as with external freedom, is hard work. It is among the things we came here to do.

The 25th Degree, Knight of the Brazen Serpent, will be conferred on our December 14 meeting at 6:10 p.m. Brother Robert N. Kershner will present a program at the meeting.


