Scottish Rite Foundation of Florida

The Scottish Rite Foundation of Florida helps children with learning disabilities by supporting 14 clinics located throughout the entire state of Florida. It depends upon donations made by corporations and individuals, most of whom are members of the Scottish Rite, their families, or friends.

The current annual commitment made to these clinics is \$260,000 with \$125,000 of that earmarked to the 7 clinics run by John Hopkins/All Children's Hospital. The balance goes to the other 7 various clinics. This means we need to raise \$269,500 to cover our commitment to the clinics plus the minimal necessary expenses.

The fiscal year just ended on June 30, 2021. Our Valley of Tampa managed to achieve only 76.31% of our \$85,000 goal. That means we needed to short the clinics by over \$20,000 just from our Valley's shortfall. In many prior years we were able to meet our goal due to some bequests left to the foundation from our deceased Brothers and families. This year those bequests were not there to cover our shortage.

I'd like to thank all of those who have given in the past and especially thank you for continuing your support in the future. Our commitment to the children is ongoing. Our pledge as a Valley, and as individual members of the Scottish Rite, is ongoing. Our Valley's goal for this fiscal year, July 1, 2021 - June 30, 2022, is \$85,000. Everyone is encouraged to help in any way possible.

Some ways you can help:

1. Leave a bequest in your will for either a specific amount or the "remainder" of your estate after all of your named beneficiaries' bequests have been satisfied. (NOTE: If you do not have a Florida will or it has been years since it has been updated you are advised to see a qualified advisor for information about wills).
2. Ask a corporation to make a donation to the Scottish Rite Foundation of Florida, a 501(c)3 non profit charity. Most large corporations are very generous about helping local charities.
3. Support the direct mail campaign (if you don't take the free gift, it helps the foundation).
4. Log onto: [smile.Amazon.com](https://smile.amazon.com) to set up The Scottish Rite Foundation of FLORIDA as your chosen charity at Amazon for you and your friends. There is no cost to you and the foundation will get .5% of the sales price of your purchases. Encourage everyone to do it.

6. There is a line on your dues bill for an optional donation to the foundation - add what you can.
7. Mail a check to the office in Tampa, or present it at a Consistory meeting
8. Ask your family to request, upon your passing, that donations be made to the SRF in lieu of flowers

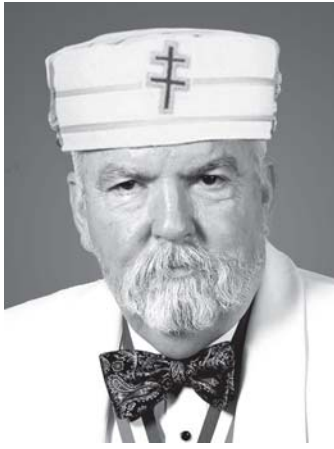

Degree Work

Elsewhere in this Bulletin is the first draft of the Fall Reunion scheduled for October 16 and 23. It

is subject to confirmation by the Degree Masters.

The 6th Degree (Confidential Secretary) and 16th Degree (Prince of Jerusalem) need to be reconstituted. The former is a short degree (25 minutes) and is destined for our March monthly meeting. Several Brethren have a copy of the adopted ritual for evaluation. Theatrical skills are important in this Degree – Solomon and King Hiram have an exchange that must be in character. The 16th Degree has a large cast and necessitates a lot of practice. It is normally a Fall Reunion Degree (but not this Fall). Investigating the origins of our Work

Studying Masonic ritual and philosophy often encourages the reading of history and ancient literature. We come to discern what our ancient Brethren may have studied to develop our Work. We may become “richer” when we go back to original sources.

Marcus Porcius Cato (95-46 BCE), referred to as Cato the Younger, was discussed in the AASR article of the March *Sands Magazine* and in March-April edition of this Bulletin. He was a historical figure our predecessors studied. His character was to be admired and emulated.

Cato recently was “discovered” in an ancient writing. He appears in the Purgatorio of the Divine Comedy written by Dante Alighieri (1265-1321 CE). This work is a poem deemed to be a classic among literary scholars.

Dante placed Cato as the “guardian,” Masons might call him the “tiler,” at the base of the island on which Purgatory rose. Cato’s role was to ascertain new arrivals had sufficient humility before commencing their climb through Purgatory. He provided instruction on the four cardinal virtues to prepare them for that journey. Cato’s role in the *Comedy* has a familiar ring to it. Our predecessors probably read it and would encourage us to do so. Indeed, it is included among the works Albert Pike used in writing *Morals and Dogma*. 🐾

Shadows



It was a beautiful, cloudless day at the beach. The tide ebbed and flowed, and children built little sandcastles or played in the water. As I walked along, I tried to soak in the blessings provided by the Creator of the world.

“Move, Dad!” said my daughter in an annoyed tone, shattering my silent celebration. I soon learned my offense was that, by standing near her, I had created a shadow, blocking the sunlight as she reclined in a beach chair.

The Cambridge Dictionary defines shadow as “an area of darkness, caused by light being blocked by something.”

As our society takes its first tentative steps out of “the shadows” of the past year or so, perhaps we might reflect upon what is needed to create a shadow. If darkness is the absence of light, then a shadow is the temporary darkness caused by interference with the light’s source. A shadow only occurs when there is both the presence of light and a source of interference.

Most children at one time or another play with shadows. Sometimes their shadows are friends, and at other times even an enemy in an imaginary fight. Adults, perhaps unknowingly, continue our special relationships with shadows.

Some days, we allow people, situations, or objects to block the sunshine temporarily from our lives. We too often focus on the shadows and overlook the light that still exists. If we could simply realize that the shadow is the result of the interference of light, then we might also realize that we at least still have the light available to us.

You see, like much of life, the story of the shadow is all about perspective. If I stand on a spot during a sunny day, I will cast a shadow. If I do not move, ultimately the shadow still moves because the sun, the source of light, moves unimpeded by

me. If I leave the area, the shadow leaves. In this sense, the shadow is within my control.

When we find ourselves in a shadow, we must remember that by simply moving, by changing our perspective relative to the light, we can realize that we are not in darkness, but simply caught in a shadow. If we remove the interference, or shift away from it, the light returns; the shadow and the temporary darkness flee. Some days, through our actions or by placing ourselves as an object in someone’s path, we create a shadow. It might be our harsh reply, an irritated look, an obstinate opinion... or, more importantly, it might even be our unwillingness to accept another person’s perspective. Our actions, attitude, and willingness to listen are, like the shadow we cast, within our control.

Perhaps today we can all agree to avoid blocking someone’s light. After all, my daughter simply needed me to change my position by a foot or so to allow her the light she desired. Is it too much to ask that we care enough for others to shift just a bit, thereby removing a shadow and lightening their day?

Would such an approach to life not create appreciation from the Source of all Light?

The Feast of Tishri

The Scottish Rite Bodies, Valley of Tampa will celebrate the Feast of Tishri on Monday, October 11. Dinner will be served beginning at 5:45 p.m. in the Banquet Hall with the Program to follow in the Lodge Room to be announced.

The Book of Leviticus tells us that the Feast of Tishri (also known as the Feast of the Tabernacle and/or The Feast of Succoth) was started when God commanded Moses that “... in the fifteenth day of the seventh month, when ye shall have gathered in the fruit of the land, ye shall keep a feast unto the Lord seven days.” Thus it was originally a harvest or gathering festival, and a time to give thanks.

This feast was still held in the time of King Solomon to the extent that he timed the dedication of the Temple to coincide with it. As Scottish Rite Masons, it is considered an obligatory observance under the Statutes of the Supreme Council, as a sharing of our fraternal spirit, and a reaffirmation of our dedication to the principles of the Scottish Rite. 🐾
